Drug Money Cleaning Khomeini Plans

Suspected In Texas

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (UPI) — Large amounts of cash are being routed through south Texas banks, indicating a possible money cleaning operation by drug smugglers, a U.S. attorney said.

Edward Prado said recently he is combining forces with the Internal Revenue Service and federal law enforcement agencies to determine if all the cash in south Texas belonged to wealthy Mexicans who invest in the United States or to narcotics dealers who sell in this country.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI) — Veteran blues performer Walter "Furry" Lewis was in critical condition Saturday, breathing with the aid of a respirator following a heart attack.

More Executions

ANKARA, Turkey (UPI) — Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini vowed Saturday to avenge the murder of one of his close aides and the Islamic regime declared it would press ahead with a campaign of executions to stamp out opposition.

"We don't like killing these young people, but what can we do?" Tehran radio quoted Executive Affairs Minister Behzad Nabavi as saying of the more than 600 executions of opponents in the last 2 1/2 months.

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI) — A kidnapped Brazilian real estate heir was released unharmed after his family paid a reported \$2 million ransom, possibly demanded to pay off his father's gambling debt, police said Saturday.

Still Can't Go Home

NORCO, La. (UPI) — Civil defense officials said Saturday 56 families would spend another night away from their homes as crews tried to put back on the track two derailed tankcars carrying highly flammable chemicals.

Authorities advised residents to leave their homes in case the cars exploded during attempts to move them from a fence near a Louisiana Power & Light substation.

NEW LONDON, Conn. (UPI) — The Coast Guard said late Saturday it may have located the wreckage of the Karen E, the cabin cruiser that sank with six people aboard because of — its owner claims — a collision with a barge.

Blast Kills 20

KAMPALA, Uganda (UPI) — A land mine exploded under a bus near Kampala Saturday, killing 20 civilians, Radio Uganda reported.

The blast in which an undisclosed number of other people were injured was the second in a week to kill bus passengers and followed claims by the opposition leader that government forces were responsible for "atrocities" against civilians.

Salem Crash Fatal

SALEM, Ind. (UPI) — Doris Baron, 51, Salem, was killed Saturday in a head-on crash on U.S. 60, two miles west of Salem.

Indiana State Police said Mrs. Baron's car collided with a car driven by Jeffrey Dougherty, 28, Salem. Dougherty was taken to a Louisville, Ky. hospital.

County Wins National MH Membership Award

Cass County has won national recognition for the second consecutive year.

Archie Givens Jr., president of the National Mental Health Association, announced in a speech Friday night at Indianapolis that the Cass County chapter is the winner of the national membership award.

The local chapter, under the leadership of Executive Director Mary Lou Wedekind, attained an all-time record of 2,400 members this year, 150 more than last year, when it first won the national membership award for having more members than any other county in the United States with less than 100,000 population.

The new award will be presented to the Cass

membership chairman at the national convention to be held Oct. 13-17 in Washington, D.C.

Givens was the principal speaker at the state association's annual Leadership Conference awards banquet in the Hilton Hotel in downtown Indianapolis.

Mary Lynch of Galveston, veteran Gold Lady for the Mental Health Association, was presented a pin for 10,000 hours of volunteer service for the mentally ill in Cass County.

Jar Containing Fetus Found Along Highway

A fully developed male fetus in a gallon jar of formaldehyde was found along Ind. 25 north of the city Friday morning.

Donald Smith, State Police Detective Sergeant, said the fetus, developed approximately five or six months, might belong to a medical or scientific laboratory, but as yet said there were no leads as to where the jar came from.

The jar lid was labeled "formaldehyde changed Oct. 20, 1966." Two highway road workers found the fetus

around 9 a.m. Friday while picking up trash in an area nine miles north of Logansport between Metea and Caston School.

The jar was in a battered cardboard box next to a fence about 10 yards off the roadway, Smith said.

The road workers took the jar to Fulton Town Marshal Roger Slack, who contacted state police.

Smith said state police Friday and Saturday were checking all hospitals and laboratories in the area to determine if anyone is missing a fetus.

According to Fisher, who is also a member of the Shelbyville Fire Department, the Fairland Fire Department was notified of the fire at 4:17 a.m.; the house was engulfed in flames when firefighters arrived but the fire was under control by about 4:30 a.m. Lee said the fire had apparently been smoldering for about two hours. He said the cause of fire was determined to be faulty wiring. The house was a total loss.

Versa Bowers was born Jan. 20, 1900, in Paducah, Ky., the daughter of Charley and Laura Lee Sullivan. Her first marriage was to John O. Bowers on July 5, 1918. She was married Oct. 27, 1947, to William David Bowers who died May 9, 1960.
